## *Birders Thank Village Green*

Since birder Don Sterba's discovery in December of a Worm-eating Warbler at the Village Green, birders have been flocking here to catch a glimpse of the bird, usually found east of the Rocky Mountains. Several have written notes of gratitude for being able to visit the Green, including Dick Barth, a West Hollywood resident and longtime Village Green birder. "We very much appreciate being able to bird your beautiful Village Green property... quite a special place," he wrote. "I believe the species list for the grounds is now up to 123." Following is a January update from Don and several recent thank-you notes from visiting birders.

## **Birder Don Sterba – January Update**

There should be fewer strange birders roaming around the Worm-eating Warbler area now, but there is still quite a bit of interest in this rarity that has attracted ardent birders from the San Francisco Bay area and points even farther away. I intend to still look for it fairly often in order to determine how long it stays here before migrating back to its summer grounds (likely east of the Mississippi River).

Due to this concentrated coverage by excellent birders, we have added a few more species to the official list of birds seen "using" (not just flying over) The Village Green:

1. Townsend's Solitaire
2. Varied Thrush
3. Pine Siskin

(Jan. 7) - I saw the Worm-eating Warbler again this morning, at a little after 7:00 a.m., in back of unit #5396 as it picked its way through fallen leaves in search of "worms" - actually it eats caterpillars (that used to be called "worms" a long time ago).

In order to keep this bird reasonably content in its current foraging area, it would help if all the fallen leaves are left on the ground and not raked up or blown away. Ground cover such as this also helps preserve soil moisture, so less watering is required. If someone can contact the person in charge of grounds keeping, maybe you can suggest that the leaves be left as is—at least in the areas around Garage Court 6 and the residential units (front and back) on both sides of Garage Court 6.

Above is a photo I took Dec. 28 while on the annual Los Angeles Christmas Bird Count. The warbler was perched low in a hedge along the west side of the laundry room in back of unit #5396.
