VG Community to Meet February 6 for Annual Meeting

On February 6, the Village Green community will gather at Baldwin Hills Elementary for its annual meeting to discuss issues affecting the Green, elect new board members, and vote on any new proposals.

The community will elect five people to the nine-member board. Any owner can be nominated to serve the one- and two-year terms. Candidates will speak at forums held at the Clubhouse on Tuesday, January 19 at 6:30 p.m. and on Saturday, January 23 at 10:00 a.m.

Topics of discussion at the annual meeting will likely include the need for ongoing maintenance projects such as replacing dated sewer, water and irrigations lines.

"The board of directors will look to the homeowners to help determine the priority and funding for projects to be completed within the next five to six years," said Steve Haggerty, president of the Village Green Owners' Association.

In November, the board of directors, as permitted in the VGOA bylaws, raised homeowner assessments (beginning in January 2010) by 7% to pay for much needed improvements around the Green. Despite a leaner operating budget to pay for things like landscape maintenance, security and staff salaries, more funds are needed to repair or replace major components of the Village Green's infrastructure.

Haggerty is quick to point out that the increased assessment will not cover all projects the board hopes to fund as part of

beautiful leather interiors.




The Colisum in Rome, prototype to modern day stadiums and namesake to the Village Green's southern border.

Voting Policy for Delinquent Owners

Do you owe the VG payment for a fine or work order? You can vote in the election! Are you delinquent on your monthly assessments? Your voting rights will be suspended.

In order to clarify voting rights, at the November, 2009 meeting, the Board of Directors passed a Resolution providing that voting rights will be suspended only for failure to pay delinquent assessments, not for non-payment of fines, work orders, or other charges.

a five- to six-year revitalization plan. One likely topic of discussion is the funding to repair sinking buildings 8 and 14, which is causing concerns for the residents who live there. According to Haggerty, the board is still determining the scope of the repairs and soliciting quotes and will then investigate possible funding sources.

It's possible that the property assessment survey conducted by Gafcon, Inc., will be ready for the meeting. "They didn't account for some work we've already completed," said Haggerty. "We're working with them to get an accurate report that reflects the work that still needs to be done. When it's ready, we will probably hold a presentation if its not ready in time for the annual meeting."

Members of the Society spoke about the various birds they see here, the rare birds seen this year, and the importance of urban forests. I talked a bit about the Village Green and how the landscape has developed over the years. After coffee and snacks, the group of residents, kids, and Audubon Society members toured the Green with binoculars looking for birds. The Audubon members mentioned how important listening for birdcalls is in bird watching—some birds were heard but not seen. The whole group got to see a Northern Parula that day. This is such a rare bird in Southern California that the Audubon Society wrote a notice for its newsletter about the sightings here at the Green.

October 18: UCLA Landscape Architecture Students

Professor Don Marquardt returned to the Village Green with his class from UCLA Extension's program in Landscape Architecture. The field trip has been a perennial favorite for several years. Their visit included a one-hour presentation on the history of Village Green and its landscaping and a walking tour of the grounds where students identified many of our rare trees, shrubs and plants. Professor Marquardt and an eager student even volunteered to come back to help identify a few difficult specimens for our cultural landscape survey.

November 15: Emerging Green Builders

Nine members of Emerging Green Builders, a chapter of the United States Green Building Council, visited the Village Green to learn about the many sustainable building practices excecuted here. I talked about the site planning and the Radburn idea and how these models fit with sustainability concerns, as well as sustainable features of our buildings. This group would be a valuable resource if Village Green ever forms a Sustainability Committee; they were spontaneously thinking of possible "green" improvements for us to possibly implement!

Dorothy will research and develop preservation strategies to assist Stein's seven major communities in maintaining their National Historic Landmark status and to attract funding. These communities include the National Historic Landmarks of Radburn (New Jersey), Chatham Village (Pennsylvania), Greenbelt, Maryland, and Baldwin Hills Village (now known as our very own Village Green). This project also will help three of Stein's potential National Historic Landmark communities in New York City—Sunnyside Gardens, Phipps Gardens, and Hillside Homes.

Village Green resident Greg Smith, by trade a TV cameraman, won an Emmy for his work on the American Idol finale! Greg got his start while in college. Seniors on the Move - The Black Hills of South Dakota

On October 3, 50 seniors departed by motor coach on a nine-day, escorted, historical journey to the Black Hills of South Dakota. The spectacular scenery along the way took us into nature's most enchanting creations, crossing California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah, Wyoming, and South Dakota

The scenic, historic, and scientific places visited along the way included the Utah Museum of Fine Arts; the Tate Geological Museum in Casper, Wyoming; and the Western Wyoming Natural History Museum, in Rock Springs, Wyoming.

Arriving at our destination, we encountered four days of snow and temperatures dipping into the 20s. What an adventure! The motor coach driver

even had to place chains on the bus tires. However, the weather did not deter us from visiting the breathtaking treasures of Mount Rushmore National Memorial, America's "Shrine of Democracy," the Crazy Horse Monument, the High Plains Western Heritage Center, and Deadwood, former home of Wild Bill Hickock and Calamity Jane.

A tour of Wildlife Loop Road at Custer State Park driving through the rolling prairies and pine-covered hills offered one of the best spots in the region to view native wild animals. We learned about the adaptations and behaviors of the bison, moose, elk, and wild burros. How exciting visiting the Buffalo Corrals, the largest land mammal in North America, it can stand six feet at the shoulders and weigh over 2,000 pounds. The adventure was awesome and enjoyed by all.

Expo Line Opening Delayed

Village Green residents will have to endure continued street closures and heavy traffic on La Cienga Boulevard and La Brea Avenue as construction on the new Expo Line has been delayed by an additional year on the line's aerial stations.

The first part of the city's light rail into the westside will hopefully open this summer, taking passengers from 7th Street/Metro Center in Downtown to Crenshaw Blvd. Transit officials had hoped to open all of Phase 1 this summer. Delays were caused by complications laying track along the Blue Line in Downtown, as well as adding an unplanned stop at and safety features at USC, reports the *Los Angeles Times*. The price tag has risen more than \$220 million over its original \$640 million budget.

When it is finished, the first phase of the project will connect the Village Green to the shops and restaurants of downtown Culver City, furniture shopping at the Helms Bakery building, new learning experiences at the museums at Exposition Park and USC, entertainment at L.A. Live and the Staples Center and the nightlife and businesses of downtown Los Angeles.

Village Green residents will be able to enjoy 8.6 miles of landscaped bike and pedestrian paths that will run along the train line and also the artwork of local artists at each station.

A second phase of the project will continue through Culver City and West L.A., ending at Santa Monica's Third Street Promenade. In December 2008, voters approved Measure R, a half-cent sales tax increase, enabling the project to be completed without federal funds as early as 2014, though that timeline is now uncertain. The first phase was funded by the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (Metro) with over \$500 million of state funding.

In recent years Metro has placed an emphasis on connecting the city through a series of light rails, or above

ground trains. Though sometimes criticized for not being as safe as their underground counterparts, light rails are aptly suited for our city's vast sprawl, enabling builders to cover more ground for less money.

It's unclear how the budget overruns and delays on the Expo Line will effect other projects. Federal matching funds are currently being sought for an underground subway extension of the red line along Wilshire Boulevard to Santa Monica. Other priorities include a light rail

along the Crenshaw corridor to connect the Expo Line to LAX and the Green Line, and a Green Line extension to Torrance. Last summer a second arm to the Gold Line was completed from Union Station to East Los Angeles.

Village Green Hikers on the March With December 17th's group walk through the



neighboring hills to the south, Village Green's new walking and hiking group has completed three local excursions in as many months. Each time there has been a full 50 per cent increase in participants from the time before. In October, 10 strong, they went to Baldwin Hills Overlook State Park, which offers dazzling views of Village Green and other various sights, including the Pacific Ocean, the Hollywood Sign, and downtown Los Angeles. The day after Thanksgiving, 15 hikers took a three-mile circuit through Kenny Hahn Park. There were 23 souls (and 46 soles) participating on the nighttime holiday lights walk. One member reportedly stated, "World domination is our goal," but this could not be verified. The evening sky was clear with relatively mild temperatures, and the walkers enjoyed festively decorated houses and lawns, spectacular city views, and warm companionship. A highlight was the locally famous Gift House on Sanchez and Cochrane, dark for the last couple of years but this season back to its full bedazzling splendor. Following the walk every-

one gathered in Court 6 for a festive party to replenish all those expended calories. Currently being planned is a city bus and light rail excursion with walking tour of Boyle Heights' wonderful murals, tentatively slotted for Martin Luther King weekend. Also being discussed is a walking tour of Downtown's hidden parks.
