Village Green's New Manager, Robert Bonfiglio A Man with a Plan

Robert Bonfiglio, the Village Green's new property manager since April 24, 2006, calls Village Green "a diamond in the

rough." His goal is to smooth away the rough and make Village Green a gem.

"Experience counts," he says. And his experience in facilities management—creating budgets, overseeing construction projects, instituting recycling programs and developing real estate, will stand him in good stead.

Since coming to California from the East Coast (he graduated from Long Island State University with a degree in marketing), he has worked in management capacities for major movie-production studios: Disney, Paramount, Fox, Warner Brothers.

Robert has realized that in addition to reporting to the Board of Direc-

tors, he will be working with the various committees of residents who advise the Board on formulating policy and rules. He wishes, he

says, to bring committees together on group projects. He sees his role as a catalyst.

His big project now is devising a long-term plan for organizing, operating and maintaining the Village Green facility. (The plan will first, of course, go to the Board of Directors for approval.)

At the town hall meeting on Sat-

urday, June 17, Robert described this plan as the "truth" of the Village Green, which will stand as the guiding document for future maintenance. He explained that even though members of the Board will come and go, and owners will come and go, this document can remain unchanged as a guide for decisions about maintenance of buildings and landscape, as well as a document of past maintenance.

Robert says that once the plan is approved, this complex will be organized and running smoothly. Then, the Village Green will truly be a gem.


FROM THE GARDEN GURUS.... It's patio revival time !!!

Have you noticed what is going on in the LA Real Estate market during the last few months?

Many of the old business buildings in downtown Los Angeles are being converted to living spaces with small square footage, high rents, and high purchase prices AND few, if any, common green areas or patios! It is evident that real estate will be calling for much more high-density housing, as evidenced by apartments and condos replacing single dwellings all over the city.

Once again, Village Green comes out on top because of what it has to offer its residents, including enormous green spaces and very livable, usable balconies and patios. Unfortunately, many of our patios are underutilized and have fallen into decay and disrepair.

This becomes a challenge to those of you who want to upgrade your living spaces and be conscientious stewards



Create a Hummingbird Oasis

Attract Hummingbirds with these Plants

- Columbine
- · California fuchsia
- Heart-leaved penstemon
- Penstemon
- · Hummingbird sage
- Island bush snapdragon

By planting the appropriate plant material, we can do away with hummingbird feeders and train our hummingbird population to feed right from the plants, a situation that is better for the birds and for the Green.

Some species of plants that are natural hummingbird attractors include Columbine (mentioned in the last issue of *Highlights*), California fuchsia, heart-leaved penstemon, penstemon, hummingbird sage, and island bush snapdragon. If your patio gets at least 3–4 hours of sun per day, these plants should survive. Many of the patios in the Green are too shady to support sun-loving hummingbird plants. If this is you, the plants to try are ferns and fuchsias.

Revitalize your patio with plants to attract hummers, thereby enhancing the area and creating a healthier environment for all.

TRY OUT THE NEW MEMORIAL BENCH

Have you seen the new bench in the Central Green south of the rose garden? Janos Damanovitz has made a contribution toward the bench in memory of his longtime friend Myrtle Miller. They enjoyed daily walks together around the Green. Originally from Louisiana, she lived in Court 17 for 30 years.

Known as the Central Park Bench, the new seat is very close to the design of the original Village Green bench, which can be seen in a 1940s video made by one of the Village Green architects, Reginald Johnson. A number of benches were included in the Barlow landscape plans, the original plans for the Green's landscaping, but were never installed.

If you would like to help bring more of these benches to the Green, a

matching fund program is being developed by the Design Review Committee.

Town Hall Meeting 2006

Everything you wanted to know about maintenance, parking, trees, landscaping, safety and more

If you missed the Court Council's Town Hall Meeting, on June 17, 2006, you missed the most thorough, detailed account of the governing of Village Green that has come in recent years. The meeting was scheduled to last from 10 a.m. to noon. People were still in deep conversation outside the clubhouse when I left at 1:20 p.m. We estimate that about 80 people came to the meeting, which is possibly our largest turnout in recent history.

For the first half of the meeting, the Board answered prepared questions submitted to Court Council by residents before the meeting. In addition to these, free choice questions from the audience in the second half of the meeting generated much fervor.

Safety tips recommended by a surprise visitor, Senior Lead Officer Henly Hawkins from the LAPD, also kept the audience captured. The manager's responses and his description of a proposed 5–10-year plan also held interest.

Questions provided to Court Council representatives were divided into five categories. "Overview" questions included long range goals for 2006, earthquake insurance, CC&Rs, and Ross Morgan provisions. "Maintenance" questions covered everything about maintaining the buildings and landscaping. "Violations/Parking" questions handled everything from nuisance questions to perimeter parking. "Committee" questions addressed

modifications of units. "Safety" questions addressed a potential increase in crime. The free choice questions expanded upon these and broached other inserests.

If you want to learn more about the Board's handling of issues or have an unresolved problem, we urge you to attend a Board meeting on the fourth Tuesday of every month. Minutes from the Town Hall Meeting will be posted in the laundry rooms, and be available on the Web site (villagegreenla.net). Court Council appreciates the cooperation of the Board and the expressed concerns of residents who attended the meeting.

HAROLD GRAVES' MAINTENANCE CORNER Checklist for Avoiding Water Leaks

OUTSIDE HOSES

After watering your yard, always turn off the water from source at the spigot by tightly turning the handle. Never stop the water using
the hose's spray nozzle; too much water pressure can burst your hose.

WATER HEATERS

- Periodically check the closet where your water heater is located for leaks:
 - 1. Look at the flexible piping inlet (cold water) and outlet (hot water).
 - 2. Check the heater's drain faucet.
 - 3. If you have a gas heater, make sure it has a pressure release valve.
- You should drain your water heater completely at lease once a year.
- Check your warranty. Water heater factory warranties are often only for 5 years.

SINKS

Check under kitchen sink for leaks: around the shut off valve, the U-shaped pipe (called the trap), and the waste line.

TOILETS

- If your toilet tank keeps flushing every 3 minutes, check the Fluidmaster toilet flush sealant to see if it needs replacement, or check the flapper around the fill pipe for leaks.
- If you discover water on the floor around your toilet.
 - 1. Check the gasket and screws under the tank for moisture.
 - 2. Check around base of toilet—the wax ring could be leaking, or bolts could be broken.
 - 3. Check the supply line to the toilet, and the angle stop.



Notes from the Board

Approved Board meeting minutes are posted on the board by the Clubhouse door. Board meetings are held the fourth Tuesday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the Clubhouse.

The Board would like to thank all residents who attended the annual Town Hall Meeting held on June 16th. The meeting, which was coordinated by our Court Council Committee, was well attended. It is this type of homeowner participation that promotes greater community awareness and involvement. As homeowners, we owe it to ourselves to be involved. We all have an opportunity to make a difference in our Village Green community. Let's get connected.

Notes from the Manager

As reported by Robert Bonfiglio, Property Manager

The Board approved a bid for the garage repair work to be done in Cts. 2, 3, and 15. The bid for Clubhouse HVAC replacement was tabled for additional follow-up. Sewer replacement continues for Cts. 8, 10, and possibly Ct. 9. A proposal from the Landscape Committee for landscape plant replacement around the Clubhouse was approved. Painting of buildings continues and is going very well. The re-pipe project is continuing with Cts. 11 and 13 scheduled to begin in late August. Work on serpentine walls continues. DWP is providing a temporary water supply line due to the broken well pump. General Pump Co. is working on the problem.

Incident Reports

May 19—a vehicle in Ct. 14 was towed away. Under VG rules of parking enforcement, if a vehicle receives 72-, 48- and 24-hour Notices to Tow for a parking violation, and the owner fails to comply, the vehicle will be towed.

May 31—a resident of Ct. 9 reported an attempted break-in, but due to an alarm system installed in the unit, only a window had been forced open.

June1—a resident reported seeing a man on top of the ledge above their door. The suspect had fled by the time Security arrived. Calls were received from residents in Cts. 16 and 17 complaining that a transient was walking around making loud noises. Security located the man and escorted him off the property.

June 4—a resident reported someone drove a car into the mailbox in front of the VG office causing extensive damage. Security got a license number and a report was made to LAPD.

June 8—a resident in Ct. 6 reported a possible burglary in process. Security arrived and observed a suspect in his late teens on the patio. When the suspect saw Security he jumped the patio wall and ran. He left behind his bike. LAPD was called.

June 20—a resident complained that a neighbor was knocking on her door at all times of the day, disturbing her. The resident said she was going to call LAPD.

Committee News and Reports

Budget and Finance Committee—The Committee held meetings on June 1st and June 8th. On the 1st, voted to send resolution to BOD to communicate to owners the Board's decision not to fund \$25,000 monthly in the Interior Plumbing Project. Committee also discussed items on spreadsheet for January through April. On the 8th, the Committee continued discussion on the balance sheet for April, income statement for March, and the general ledger.

Court Council—Reports from court reps included: Ct. 1—after recent burglaries in VG Jean Gaignard and Dagmar Buck held a "Know Your Neighbor" meeting; Ct. 3—reported problem with repeated removal of laundry room schedule from bulletin board and the need for a work order to remove a long-standing dead tree. Cts. 3&4—held a "Know Your Neighbor" potluck on June 11; Ct. 16—reported the VG property manager was very accessible and helpful in replying to concerns in court. A "Know Your Neighbor" meeting was held on June 10. Ct. 1—reported people are still jumping over the gate on Sycamore. Safety Committee report—Neighborhood Watch reps are needed in Cts. 9, 13, and the East and West Circles. Reps were reminded to keep bulletin boards current. In the absence of Daniel Millner, co-chair, Carolyn Middleton volunteered to take the minutes at the Town Hall Meeting.

Cultural Landscape Report Committee—Committee reviewed the final draft of the recommended landscaping renovation of the VG Clubhouse, which will be given to the property manager. Committee agreed that CLR, Tree, and Landscape Committees should have joint oversight of the Clubhouse landscape renovation efforts. Committee discussed criteria for documentation; photos; tree data; and verification by CLR, Tree, and Landscape Committees of tree replacement/removal. Also discussed photo protocol for CLR inventory documentation.

Design Review Committee—Committee reviewed homeowner modification requests for 5 units. Committee discussed the feasibility of VG standardizing vendors and designs of iron security gates, exterior-mounted mailboxes and security doors to help owners and aid VG's enforcement of design standards. Owners would still be responsible for paying for these items and their upkeep. R.J. Stein Company has been approved to paint the 10 remaining buildings in this year's

painting cycle and DRC will schedule meetings with owners of these buildings. The Architectural Standards Handbook will be ready by next DRC meeting.

Landscape Committee—Committee will submit recommendations for plant replacement for the Clubhouse landscape project. A plan for the renovation of the Clubhouse patio was outlined, including plants to be installed.
