10 Emergency Life-saving Items – Get Yourself Ready for a Disaster

 □ Water – 14 day supply –1 gallon a day, so 14 gallons per person/child/pet ○ keep elevated (not on concrete) and in dark place
☐ First aid kit and manual - keep small kit with your go-bag
 □ Cash and important documents small bills (\$1s and \$5s) identification documents (e.g. driver's license, birth certificate, marriage certificate) deeds, insurance documents, photocopy of credit cards put photocopy and scanned copies on a thumb drive into a sealed plastic bag (to protect from water damage) can save backup scan to cloud
☐ Clothes – old comfortable clothes and shoes
☐ Medicine – 7 day supply (also keep prescription papers so can get refills)
☐ Flashlight and batteries - get long-lasting regular batteries (not rechargeables), small flashlight with LED light bulbs, store in your go-bag
 □ Tools (gas shut-off wrench, pry bar, fire extinguisher, duct tape) ○ Do not turn gas valve to off position unless you smell gas ○ To turn gas off, use wrench to turn valve to vertical (pointing up and down) ○ Gas shut-off valve is in patio of the downstairs unit, so know your neighbors
□ Food
 minimum of 7 day supply per person/child/pet, non-perishable, along with manual can opener
 □ Radio and batteries transistor radio tuned to news station such as KFI AM 640 or KNX AM 1070 (battery-operated or hand-crank radios available) FRS radios (Family Radio Service) to communicate among ourselves.

9 Easy Steps to Perform After a Moderate Earthquake

- Step 1: Take care of yourself and your loved ones first!
- Step 2: Protect your head, hands, and feet
 Turn on your FRS radio and begin monitoring pre-determined
 neighborhood emergency channel
- Step 3: Inspect Natural Gas Valve and shut it off if you smell, hear, or see gas leaking (Village Green has automatic gas shut-off valves. Gas valves for upstairs units are located in the patios of the downstairs units.)
- Step 4: Shut off water main to protect the water in your water heater from contamination and reverse drainage
- Step 5: Post OK / HELP sign
- Step 6: Place fire extinguisher on sidewalk in case a team needs one for a small fire
- Step 7: Head directly to and check-in at the Neighborhood Gathering site Observe possible issues or HELP signs on the way in and report at check-in
- Step 8: Organize Response with an Incident Commander
 Send out separate teams to investigate reported issues, HELP signs,
 and homes without signs or with known vulnerable residents
 Responders are always in teams of at least 2, no one goes anywhere
 alone!
 Teams communicate back to IC with FRS or GMRS radios
- Step 9: Meet Back at Gathering Area periodically to gather new resources and report response actions or to learn about new issues that have been reported
